

Trip Driving Thoughts

Is your car ready for a road trip? A number of Corvairs will be heading for Salida in May for the Tri-State Corvair Meet. A short checklist follows and some of these 'checks' depend upon how often your Corvair has been in use since Glenwood Springs last year and activity during our crummy wintertime in 2022-2023.

The most obvious is fresh oil/filter and a check of your diff and trans levels. Along with this is grease to front suspension parts and checking your past records for wheel bearing service both front and rear. Also check tires including spare for proper air pressures as well as tread quality and bounce car on each corner as shock absorber test. Next is lights to ensure all work in case driving times are extended into darkness as well as safety of brake and turn signal lamps. Wiper blades as well as washers and fluid in bottle are on the list. While your head is in the trunk check master cylinder fluid level. Hopefully each of us are aware of quality of brake shoes and braking ability of their car. Needless to say check your records for tune-up schedule too.

Even though we hope by May the weather will be a little more gentle one never knows what driving through the mountains and whether we leave from Denver area or C/Springs there are still mountain pass conditions we must endure. With that in mind check blower motor and heater hoses and the cable controls move smoothly.

Does your Corvair *mark it's spot?* Of course it does because leaving a couple of spots the size of a dime while parked is normal. Now if you have a real puddle under the car it should be addressed. Running engine or gearbox (transaxle) low on lubricants makes for quick wear and more so at highway speeds.

Last just walk around your car and look at it from top to the ground. Is everything normal or is there an 'oh oh'? Also if you have not driven your car for a while then take a 10-15 mile drive out on the highway to remember how it felt at speed and also listen for noises or something that simply doesn't seem normal. This drive should be done often the year round but mother nature doesn't

always cooperate. This is also a good reason to attend either the 'Bug Out' in C/ Springs or Tri-state Tune up in Sedalia or go for broke and attend both Sunday fun days with lots of other Corvair owners.

How about a few parts and tools? Most of the list are things that should just occupy some trunk space in every Corvair. First is an extra fan belt and tools to change it. A good jack and lug wrench plus a screwdriver to remove a wheel cover. Also a short 2x4 to place under the jack in case the ground is soft. Luxury would be a 12V air compressor and tire presssure gauge should be in the glove box. A basic tool kit of end wrenches/screwdrivers/pliers/socket set and maybe a small hammer can come in handy but it is hard to know when to quit adding tools. At least a medium sized vise grip pliers can be helpful too.

Parts might include a roll of electrical tape and a bulb assortment for everything except headlights. You can add a couple of spools or partial spools of wire in a couple of gauges and fuel line and a couple of clamps too. A couple of extra fuses in 10 and 20 amp is nice to have too. If you have any of the electronic ignition systems in your distributor you should heed the manufacturers warning and carry along the old point plate and points/condenser/lead wire.

I carry an extra oil pressure switch/coil/a couple of rocker arms and pushrods/ rocker cover gasket and oil cooler seals plus assortment of normal fasteners and cotter pins. I also have torque wrench and socket for oil pressure switch etc. I just can't sleep well unless surrounded by tools and Corvair parts.

Last suggestion is if you place all or most of the above in a soft tool bag then it will conform to the shape of your trunk space. A metal box is sometimes harder to fit into an spot.

OR simply substitute your cell phone and AAA card and have more room in the front of the car.

Last is please drive carefully and have a VAIRY nice drive to Sedalia.

As you know, Toyota Motors North America loaned us a 2023 Toyota Sequola TRD Pro, to get our impressions, and to dabble in grassroots marketing. A win for both groups! After we returned to their office, our liaison, a Colorado Cars & Coffee member, invited us to check out their facility. A cheery cubicle farm awaited us, and in the basement, an impressive array of classrooms, tools, lifts and garage bays, where master technician training occurs. While we checked out the engines on display, they excitedly mentioned one particular non-profit organization they work with. That organization is TACT, or Teaching the Autism Community Trades, and is a 501(c)3 non-profit.

Autism and unemployment is a very real issue, approaching a 90% unemployment rate nationally. TACT programs and workshops, based in Englewood, Colorado, seek to enable those within the full spectrum of autism to gain employable jobs and lasting careers, and are focused in the

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skilled trades industry. You might have heard of Mike Rowe of Dirty Jobs promoting the skilled trades, and yes, Mike Rowe Works Foundation is a sponsor of TACT!

Career tracks are offered in Auto Mechanics, diagnosing engines, electrical issues, and mechanical problems. Toyota and its dealer partners donated \$20,000, three new engines for students to learn from. along with training muserial and course curriculum, while Groove Auto donated the auto lifts. Another track is Carpentry, reading blueprines. learning safe hand and power tool usage, framing, cabinetry and other woodwork. The Electrical track takes participants to develop skills in wring lights, switches, breakers and commercial electrical equipment. Welding and Computer Science are other tracks available, and TACT also offers a full range of workshops.

Learning more about TACT, I briefly spoke with the founder, Danny Combs, who described how TACT is successful in placing 83% of their students into jobs, compared to a national average of 10%. An incredible numbert

TACT recently moved into their new building in Englewood, three times larger than their old building at 18,000 square feet. And you know with any new acquisition, there are tons of renovations that have to happen, and if you would like to support, they have multiple ways to do that, ranging from donating a car, attending their events, Amazon Wish List, volunteering and many other donation options. All of this support will help them get their new area completed and make it a superior. ursique space for their students. I encourage you to check them out, and if so moved, find a way to assist them! #A
